



## Maternity Services / BadgerNet FAQs & Glossary

Ref	Question	Resolution
<b>FAQ-1: Accessing the Records</b>		
FAQ1.1	How will I know if the service user is pregnant?	A pregnancy summary widget/pod will be presented within the GNCR record. The pregnancy summary will display once an antenatal booking is entered within BadgerNet by the Maternity Services team. Those service users who have not been seen within Maternity Services will not be registered as pregnant.
FAQ1.2	How will I know if the pregnancy is active?	Within the pregnancy summary widget/pod a note will be displayed advising there is an active pregnancy ' <i>active pregnancy detected</i> '.
FAQ1.3a	I can see a pregnancy is still active even though a service user has given birth, how long does pregnancy summary remain?	Following birth, a BadgerNet record will automatically close 56 days post-partum. An additional 42 days has been added to show the pregnancy summary widget/pod for a longer period to allow end users to continue to view during an extended postpartum period. In the event that a record is not closed, the pregnancy summary will disappear if the pregnancy start date is higher than 44 weeks (308 days).
FAQ1.3b	What is the logic that has been applied to the pregnancy summary display?	Pregnancy summary widget will be visible if: Either EDD By Scan, EDD Agreed or EDD By Date is found in the data received + - If there is no pregnancy close date AND the current date is not greater than the pregnancy start date + 308 days - If the current date is not greater than the pregnancy closed date + 42 days
FAQ1.4	How will I know if the pregnancy is no longer active?	Within the pregnancy summary widget/pod a note will be displayed advising the pregnancy is closed ' <i>Closed pregnancy detected within xx days period. Pregnancy closure date xx/xx/xxxx</i> '.
FAQ1.5	Will the information be lost once a pregnancy is closed?	No, the information contained within the pregnancy summary will still be available within their logical associated widgets/pods.
FAQ1.6	How will I know if there has been an early loss?	Any pregnancy losses, including registrable and non registrable births, will appear within the 'birth outcome' in the pregnancy summary and in the miscellaneous widget/pod. Please note, early pregnancy losses do not always occur within maternity services therefore if maternity services do not know about a loss, because the loss has perhaps happened at home or in Gynaecology services or A&E, this may not be recorded.
FAQ1.7	Is there a risk that the service user may have had an early loss, and this information is not available?	Yes, if a service user has had an early pregnancy loss outside of maternity services, e.g. at home or in Gynaecology services or A&E, then this information may not be recorded within BadgerNet and therefore GNCR.
FAQ1.8	Can I see previous pregnancies?	Yes, a link to any previous pregnancy can be seen on the pregnancy summary and also within the miscellaneous widget/pod. Similarly, if the previous pregnancy was



		also recorded on BadgerNet, this historical information will be available in the relevant widgets/pods.
FAQ1.9	Are there any filters to how many pregnancies I can see?	No, no filters have been applied.
FAQ1.10	Are the risk assessments for all periods of the pregnancy?	Yes, the risk assessments cover antenatal, intrapartum, and postpartum. Additional work has been raised to split the risk assessments by period, this will be addressed during phase 2 (no timelines available).
FAQ1.11	If the service user receives a blood transfusion after the antenatal booking, will the record be updated?	No, the blood transfusion history is only recorded from a point in time, at the antenatal booking. It is possible that a service user has a blood transfusion after this period.
FAQ1.12	Can I view patient deceased information from BadgerNet?	No, deceased patient data does not fall under the legal basis of direct care.
FAQ1.13	Do all NENC pregnant service users have a record in BadgerNet?	No, a BadgerNet record is created once the service user has had an encounter with maternity services.
FAQ1.14a	What happens when a patient moves between Trusts, can I still see their record?	Yes, all NENC care locations within BadgerNet have been enabled, therefore service users can move between Trusts and their information will follow them.
FAQ1.14b	What happens when a patient moves out of NENC, can I still see their record?	No, unfortunately GNCR do not have sharing agreements in place with organisations outside of NENC.
FAQ1.15	Are there any filters applied to the data?	No, GNCR did not implement any date filters.
FAQ1.16	What is included within the list of exclusions?	NHS England have published a list of exclusions which includes information related to fertility, gender recognition and sexual health.
FAQ1.17	What is a 'birth finding' in the encounter's widget/pod?	The birth finding details the date/time when established labour started and the date/time the last baby was born. The birth finding will only display once the last baby is born. A separate encounter will show the admission of the service user, the birth finding is specifically showing the labour and birth.
FAQ1.18	Within the source in GNCR, I can only see 'MAT', what does this mean?	In the widgets/pods there is source information which presents as 'MAT'. If you hover over 'MAT' you will see that it represents BadgerNet/Maternity information. At the moment its not possible to show the actual source location of the Trust, however we are working with our suppliers to resolve this.
FAQ1.19	If a baby was registered as a 'live' birth and subsequently passed once receiving treatment in the Neonatal services, will this information be presented?	No, the information received from BadgerNet does not include 'baby demographics'. All of the information presented related to the pregnancy / mother's record.

<b>FAQ-2: Data Overview</b>		
FAQ2.1	Future Appointments	An appointment made within maternity services, either from BadgerNet or from the Trust's local PAS.
FAQ2.2	Encounters	Encounter information will be received from the Trust PAS as well as encounters from BadgerNet. The reason for visit within the encounter will determine whether it's related to the service user's pregnancy.



FAQ2.3	Allergies and Adverse Reactions	This includes a list of current and historical allergies, including sensitivities, and adverse reactions to enable safe prescribing and treatment recommendations for a patient.
FAQ2.4	Medications	A list of active medicines that have been prescribed to the patient at the point of discharge 'to take out (TTO) / to take home (TTH).
FAQ2.5	Vaccinations	Vaccinations administered by maternity services will be displayed. Please note, the vaccination name is the name of the disease rather than the drug/vaccine that is administered.
FAQ2.6	Care Plans	The following care plans will be available within the care plan widget/pod: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Obstetric Antenatal Care Plan</li><li>• Obstetric Intrapartum Care Plan</li><li>• Obstetric Postnatal Care Plan</li><li>• Planned Place of Birth</li><li>• Risk Assessments</li></ul> Each care plan will show the latest amendments so they will always show the most up to date information.
FAQ2.7	Professional Contacts	Contacts show the professionals, within maternity services, that are caring for the service user. A request has also been made to show the birthing suite telephone number as a quick reference for end users.
FAQ2.8	Vital Signs	Vital signs information from maternity services includes: BMI Body Height Body Weight Blood Pressure (Only shows the first blood pressure recorded)
FAQ2.9	Social Context	Social context information from maternity services includes: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Safeguarding Issues<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>○ Previous Child or Children</li><li>○ Unborn Child or Children</li><li>○ Other Issues</li></ul></li><li>• Frequency of Drinking (alcohol)</li><li>• Cigarette status and consumption</li></ul>
FAQ2.10	Mental Health	Information related to a service users past and present mental health is located within the mental health widget/pod. Please note, CNTW mental health reports also appear in this widget, therefore if you are not able to see their report, click on the 'source title' within the widget and the information will re sort by alphabetical order. A request to consolidate mental health reports from maternity services has been raised.
FAQ2.11	Miscellaneous Reports	Within the miscellaneous reports, the following information from maternity services includes: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• No of babies in ultrasound scan</li><li>• EDD by last period, by scan and agreed estimation</li><li>• No of babies born</li><li>• Babies birth date / time</li><li>• Babies birth outcome</li><li>• Birth type(s)</li><li>• History of blood of transfusion</li></ul>

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## Glossary

Data Item	Description
ADM Date	Admission Date
Antenatal Booking Appointment	An Antenatal Booking Appointment is the appointment where the woman enters the maternity care pathway, characterised by information giving and detailed history-taking to help the woman choose the most appropriate Antenatal care pathway.
Antenatal Care Plan	An Antenatal Care Plan is a care plan developed within a Maternity Episode for the delivery of Antenatal care.
AUDIT - C	Alcohol use disorders identification test consumption (AUDIT C)
Cephalic	The baby is lying with their head pointing downwards, ready for birth. This is known as cephalic presentation
Children in Need	A child has been assessed and needs help and protection because of risks to their development or health, such as neglect, domestic abuse in the family, or because they are disabled.
DC Date	Discharge Date
EDD	Estimated date of delivery
EFW	Estimated Fetal weight
Fetal macrosomia (>95th centile)	A large for gestational age (LGA) baby can be defined as a baby that weighs more than 97 in 100 babies (the 97th centile)
Group B Streptococcus	Also known as Group B Strep - type of bacteria called streptococcal bacteria. It's very common in both men and women and usually lives in the bottom (rectum) or vagina. Group B Strep has implications in pregnancy due to the risk of neonatal infection.
Hydatidiform mole	A cluster of fluid-filled sacs formed in the uterus by the degeneration of chorionic tissue around an aborting embryo.

Intrapartum Care Plan	An Intrapartum Care Plan is a care plan developed within a Maternity Episode for the period of Labour and birth.
Molar Pregnancy	A molar pregnancy is when there's a problem with a fertilised egg, which means a baby and a placenta do not develop the way they should after conception. A molar pregnancy will not be able to survive.
Non-Registrable Births	Births under 24+0 weeks gestation (168 days) where the baby shows no identifiable signs of life
Postpartum Care Plan	A Postpartum Care Plan is a care plan developed within a Maternity Episode for the Postpartum period.
Puerperal Psychosis	Also known as postpartum psychosis – a serious mental health illness that can develop after giving birth.
Registrable Births	A birth taking place after 24+0 gestation. A stillbirth or termination of pregnancy is registrable only if it occurs after a gestation of 24 weeks (168 days), or more, where a baby shows no identifiable signs of life at delivery.
Team Around the Family	brings together practitioners from a wide range of different statutory and voluntary agencies to work with a family. The focus is on working with the family in a holistic way using a whole family approach.
TTO / TTH	Term used for discharged medications - To take out / to take home
VTE	Venous thromboembolism (VTE) is a condition that occurs when a blood clot forms in a vein. VTE includes deep vein thrombosis (DVT) and pulmonary embolism (PE).
